Canada Inks Deal with IRS, Allows CRA to Collect Tax Info on U.S. Residents



In February, the federal government announced that it had <u>signed a deal</u> with the United States over a new American law aimed at weeding out tax cheats in Canada.

The <u>Foreign Account Tax Compliance Act</u>, drafted in 2010 by the U.S. Internal Revenue Service, requires Canadian financial institutions to report information about anyone considered to be a U.S. resident or citizen—including dual citizens—directly to the IRS as of this July.

Minister of National Revenue Kerry-Lynne D. Findlay explained, "This is strictly a tax information-sharing agreement. This agreement will not impose any U.S. taxes or penalties on U.S. citizens or U.S. residents holding accounts in Canada. The CRA does not collect the U.S. tax liability of a Canadian citizen if the individual was a Canadian citizen at the time the liability arose. This includes dual Canada-U.S. citizens. That will not change under this agreement."

Long-anticipated Registration of Tax Preparers Program (RTPP) Underway



Two months ago in Vancouver, Minister

of National Revenue Kerry-Lynne D. Findlay launched the first of several consultations on the proposed Registration of Tax Preparers Program (RTPP). The RTPP is part of a recently announced <u>three-point plan</u> to support small and mediumsized businesses by helping them comply with tax rules and reducing red tape.

The <u>RTPP</u> is welcome news for professionals in the industry to monitor the integrity of practitioners, and I encourage you, as taxpayers, to have your say too. While most in the business are dedicated to a high standard of professionalism, a small minority continue to make life dangerous for unsuspecting taxpayers.

<u>CTV's W5</u> recently did an exposé on <u>Fiscal Arbitrators</u>, run by Larry Watts, who duped 1,800 clients into impoverishment through a scheme promising unusually big tax breaks. The disturbing part of this growing trend is that the folks involved were mostly first-time fraud victims, and this is why it's important that something be done about it.

2013 Tax Filing Deadline at the End of April!

The deadline for most personal returns is now 19 days away. Waiting until the last minute to get your taxes done is never a good idea, especially if you need them



assessed soon. Once you're ready to file your 2013 return, make arrangements TODAY rather than on April 29. Pay Taxes by Pre-authorized Debit Instead of by Cheque

CRA stopped accepting payments at the tax offices a few years ago. You can now mail them a cheque, but even better, you can pay through your bank via <u>My Account</u>.

The pre-authorized debit (PAD) service allows taxpayers registered with My Account to authorize the CRA to withdraw from their Canadian financial institution a predetermined amount on a pre-determined date.

- If you are already a My Account user, go to your account on the CRA website. Setting up a PAD agreement will be offered as an option upon login.
- During set-up, you can:
 - specify the amount of the withdrawal;
 - set the date or recurring dates when the withdrawal(s) are to be made; and
 - indicate the bank account you'd like to use to make the payment(s).

Living Outside Canada? Make Sure You Don't Owe Taxes or Need to File!



If you have moved out of the country,

either permanently or temporarily (not for vacation), it is your responsibility to ensure whether you are liable to the CRA. Depending on your situation, CRA can determine your status through the <u>Determination of Residency Status Form</u> <u>NR 73 (Leaving Canada)</u> and <u>Determination of Residency</u> <u>Status Form NR 74 (Arriving in Canada)</u>.

A recent <u>Globe and Mail article</u> explained it well. If you're not sure of your circumstances, check out CRA Tax Folio <u>S5-F1-C1</u>. It's best to consult a professional if you're still unclear. The fees you'll pay will be well worth the nightmares they'll save you.

CRA Busts Its Own Employees in Massive Fraud



In what is being exposed as an embarrassment to the Tax Agency, the

RCMP arrested seven people in February as part of <u>Project</u> <u>Coche</u>, an investigation into several alleged fraud conspiracies going back to 2008 and involving as many as 15 Canada Revenue Agency employees. Charges include bribery of public officers, conspiracy, fraud, breach of trust by a public officer, and fraud against the government. Five of the accused allegedly received commissions on tax credits obtained through fraudulent means. The Mounties said in a statement that three of those five were active CRA officials at the time the offences took place. More details to come.

New ePassports Monitoring Your Time Outside Canada and Being Shared with Other Governments



The new <u>ePassport</u> issued by Service Canada as of last year will now exchange your information with other government departments, including CRA and the IRS.

As of July 1, 2014, when Canada and U.S. border authorities start scanning the new passports, snowbirds can be deemed U.S. residents if they exceed the 183-day absence from the country, according to a <u>Knowledge Bureau Article</u>.

In her book <u>Canadians & the IRS</u>, CA/CPA (U.S. tax specialist) <u>Angela Preteau</u> explains these new regulations in detail, and much more. A recent <u>Globe and Mail article</u> confirmed many of these facts. Long-term travellers must be more diligent than ever to protect themselves from tax liability to the U.S. government.


Search and Rescue Volunteers Get New \$450 Tax Credit

Just Asking ... Just Answering

Can CRA Disallow All Business Expenses of My MLM?

Real People with Real Questions About Real Situations



Dear Neel,

I was audited for my MLM business (multi-level marketing). Essentially, CRA thinks I'm part of a scam and disallowed every deduction even though I haven't had any income for

three years. I want to appeal this but my accountant will not do it. Should I do this myself or get an expert?

Dear Richard,

I would definitely get an expert opinion, not just for the appeals process but also to consider whether CRA is correct in assessing this MLM as a scam.

I have never seen a feasible multi-level marketing scheme, reflecting a legitimate business plan, and I've written about this in several newsletters. <u>Other reputable folks, however,</u> <u>wholeheartedly agree with this arrangement</u>. According to CRA's <u>Business Income Guide</u>, not only must the business have a reasonable "expectation of profit," but the expenses must be "directly related" to generating income. While no time limit is specified, three years of no cash flow does not sound like a venture that will fly.

Also, the appeals process never guarantees anything and can get expensive if you hire a tax professional. Recently, the <u>Tax Court of Canada ruled</u> that a business that turned out to be a fraud from the beginning was not entitled to claim any expenses, because the court concluded that it was never designed to be a "for profit" enterprise.

While many people don't like audits or the conclusions they reach, sometimes not only is the audit correct but it can expose schemes that are harmful to all involved.
