Valentine's Message

Dear Clients and Friends,

I'm excited about 2018! Not only is it my 20th year in business, but I believe it will be the beginning of some big, positive changes.





The Tax System: 101 Years Later, It Looks Nothing Like It Was in 1917



Most people have no idea of the history of taxes in Canada. They started in 1917 as a temporary "war funding measure," and 101 years later, that war and many others are long gone. But the "measure" has become a deeply tentacled institution everywhere we go.

A recent <u>article by the Fraser Institute</u> contains some staggering statistics. Since Trudeau came into office in 2015, taxes have not been reduced but have actually been raised on 81% of middle income families. A <u>Knowledge Bureau article</u> points out much more. Back in 1918, the share of government revenues from personal income tax was 2.6%. By 2017, it had risen to 51%. In 1918 the average tax burden per tax filer was \$14; in 2017, \$4,120. Also in 1917, the tax return was 6 pages long with 23 lines. Today, it is over 300 lines long, with a compliancy cost of \$500 a year for Canadians to conform to the tax system. 2019 and beyond show no signs of reversal. This is clearly a monster out of control. Stay tuned for more on this!

Complicated New Canada Caregiver Credit (CCC) Replaces Family Caregiver,



Caregiver, and Infirm Dependents' Tax Credits

The new <u>Canada Caregiver Credit (CCC)</u> has some improvements, but it's a maze to navigate. It was introduced for the 2017 tax year to replace three previous credits merged into one. The <u>Knowledge Bureau explains the breakdown</u>. Essentially, the credit comes in two parts. To make things easier to understand, we'll refer to them as a "mini" and a "maxi" credit:

- A "mini" CCC of \$2,150, which must be claimed for an infirm minor child or someone for whom you are claiming a spousal amount. Remember that the term spousal amount also includes an "eligible dependent" or someone you are claiming as "equivalent to spouse."
- A "maxi" CCC of \$6,883, or a portion thereof, may be claimed if you are supporting a spouse or eligible dependent whose net income is over \$11,635. You may also claim this amount for infirm adults who are considered "other dependents." But this larger credit is never claimed for a minor child.

For 2018, the \$2,150 figure is indexed to \$2,182, the \$6,883 figure is indexed to \$6,986, and so on. Next time we will discuss claiming the Canada Caregiver Amount for minor and adult children. This is likely to keep developing based on feedback from this filing season.

Also notable is the <u>distinction between "infirm" and "disabled" dependents for tax purposes</u>. An infirm dependent is one who has "an impairment of physical or mental functions," whereas a disabled dependent has a "severe and prolonged impairment in mental or physical functions" approved with a Disability Tax Credit Certificate (T2201). What You Need to Know about CRA's New "File My Return" Method



For the 2017 tax season, CRA has launched a new service called <u>File My Return</u>. About 950,000 qualified taxpayers with simple, low income, unchanging situations can complete returns over the phone. While this <u>looks appealing</u> because you can do it in the comfort of your home for free, <u>many like</u> me in the tax professional industry have warned taxpayers of how it can lull you into complacency.

For instance, changing rules and imperceptible situations can quietly siphon deductions and benefits out of taxpayers. A common example is the disability tax credit, worth over \$2K a year. I have had several situations where clients received refunds of over \$20K (10 years) because they consulted a professional.

Many companies like mine offer free resources to help clients assess their situation, and CRA has offered volunteer tax preparation clinics for years with no objection from the industry. So it's not an income issue. We are concerned about your loss of representation and the overreach this will grow into, so I'll stay on top of this. Make no mistake, CRA will reap great dividends from the program, and they're just getting started!

Taxman Using Google Earth to Spy on Your Private Property?



In previous newsletters, I've told you

about how CRA is using social media to monitor individuals. Well, now you guessed it: Goggle Earth is that big spy cam in the sky. And that's scary because they're coming onto your private property. David Menzies of the <u>Rebel</u> recently wrote, <u>Is the taxman illicitly spying on private property in building permit shakedown?</u>

New technology is used by government agencies to find out where such structures exist, and when they're found, property owners are subjected to a shakedown for building permits and supplementary tax bills—at \$500 a day retroactive to 9 years, if they're successful. While this is more a municipal issue, don't be surprised if other agencies like CRA use it to get their cut without you knowing until it's too late.

RRSP Deadline Approaching!

This year's contribution deadline is
Thursday, March 1, 2018, for your 2017
income tax return. If you miss the deadline,
you can always use the contribution for your
2018 return. Make sure you have relevant information such
as your contribution room, Home Buyers' Plan or Lifelong
Learning Plan repayment requirements, and so forth. Check

use your CRA Account to get your information online.

Looking for a Cheap, Reputable Business? Check Out Chick-Fil-A Franchises from \$10K!



I am often asked for business

recommendations, which I rarely give. But here's one I came across last month that seems appealing, considering what's required to get started. Chick-Fil-A is very much on the bottom floor in Canada. Outside of the \$10K requirement, the individual must "be free of any other active business ventures" and be prepared to "operate the restaurant on a full-time, hands-on basis." While the fees are in U.S. funds, they absolutely pale in comparison to Taco Bell, Wendy's,

KFC, and McDonald's, where potential franchisees have to prove that they have a net worth of at least \$1.5 million and liquid assets of at least \$750,000. All told, start-up costs can range anywhere from \$1 million to \$3.5 million, and it won't make a difference if it's Canadian or American dollars!

More and Improved E-Services for 2018 Personal Returns



It's official. E-File starts first thing Monday,
February 19, 2018, for all 2017 personal
returns. Most refunds come in 1–2 weeks, and I suggest you
get direct deposit. Also, there are a variety of slips now
available online as far back as 10 years, with online mail and
more. You can link between My Account and My Service
Canada Account. When you file your return, simply take your
banking information or a blank cheque and you can have your
refund, GST Credit, and Child Tax Benefits all done. If you
forget, simply file the Direct Deposit form with CRA and they
should be able to start in 1–2 months. Corporations can E-File
all year round up to 4 years back, and can do direct deposit
via the Corporate Direct Deposit form. For further

Taxes and Crypto Currencies



As more people invest and mine digital currencies like Bitcoin, <u>CRA is</u> adding information on how to report

<u>transactions</u>. These currencies are not considered legal tender, but are treated under the "Barter Rules" and subject to reporting sales as income and capital gains and losses on trades like stocks. A <u>Knowledge Bureau article explains the details of how to handle the transactions</u>, and as time goes on, I'm sure more will be written on it.

As we head into 2018, expect CRA to put increasing emphasis on targeting digital transactions in their audit processes. Remaining above board with income generated through the likes of Bitcoin and PayPal, VRBO, and other online transactions should be a priority. I am not involved or recommending this because of its volatility, but I'm most interested in commodities-backed cryptos, which will give more solidity. So, more to come on this!

Dear Neel,

I saw a story of a family buying an old grain elevator site cheap to build a new residence, with the condition that they pay to demolish the old building and remove the wreckage. Turns out that some guy was willing

to do all that for the buyer as well as pay for the old wood, as it is unique for building a pricey house. Is that wood now taxable?

Dear Dexter,

Wow! I just love these stories and I tracked this one down, as it ran last month. The answer is always that it depends on the situation. Since this is a unique, one-time, non-commercial event, it would fall under the category of found money. Had

the property been a commercial property, any net gains or losses could be taxable income or capital for the taxpayer no matter how rare the wood was. But this can even be exempt as a personal residence sale as long as the buyer owns one matrimonial home.

It's questionable whether the taxpayer must report this to make the personal residency claim as it's only a partial sale. So he must keep all receipts, etc., in case CRA requires them.



It's a Photo Finish!

Yes, My Dear, There Is a Valentine Star!

Have you ever wondered if there was a celestial object named after the saintly love day? Yes, there is! It's the Valentine Star, more commonly known as Betelgeuse (pronounced beetle juice), and it's a favourite of many astronomers!

So why is it called the Valentine Star? Because it's red in colour, beats slowly like a giant heart, and stimulates the spirit of those attuned to it. The prominent object we can see every February 14 is this bright, scarlet star, which reaches its highest point above the horizon every Valentine's Day night between the hours of 8 and 9 p.m. It marks the shoulder star of Orion and changes in size regularly like a slowly pulsating inferno that thumps once every six years. Now when Betelgeuse is fully contracted to its smallest size, it is a whopping 500 times the width of our Sun, but when it expands to its biggest size it is almost 900 times as broad.

Betelgeuse is an extremely large, red, super-giant star, fluctuating in approximate size from the equivalent of

Mars's orbit to Jupiter's; so it's monstrous compared to our puny yellow Sun. It is the second brightest star in the constellation Orion and the ninth brightest object in the night sky. It is a vertex of the Winter Triangle and centre of the Winter Hexagon. It is possible that Betelgeuse will become a supernova, which will be the brightest ever recorded, outshining the Moon in the night sky.

Considering its size and age, it may explode within the next thousand years. Since its rotational axis is not toward the Earth, and also because of its 640 light-year distance, Betelgeuse's supernova will not cause a gamma ray burst in the direction of Earth large enough to damage our ecosystems.

So, this February, after you get the chocolates and flowers, surprise your loved ones first with a picture of the massive red star pounding like a nucleus full of cosmic love, and then show them the real deal that evening. Believe me, they'll remember it the right way!
