For those who were willing to get up early enough Saturday morning they were able to see a lunar eclipse take over the night sky.

A lunar eclipse is caused by the refraction of the sun between the earth.

This eclipse was considered rare because of how short it was.

Neel Roberts who is a photographer said, “Normally we can get a couple hours of totality but when you have it so short, especially when the sun is coming up at this time of the year, you don’t have as much opportunity to focus on the totality which is the interesting part.”

The shortness of the “blood moon” is something that is only seen once every 100 years.

The total eclipse happened around 6:00a.m. Saturday morning.
