The Sky's the Limit

It seems hard to believe that a year has passed since Leonard Nimoy made history across the world with the famous quote, "I've been away from Vulcan for years now and I figured it's time I finally came home." Meanwhile, around the same time, "By the mid-2030s, I believe we can send humans to orbit Mars and return them safely to Earth. And a landing on Mars will follow. And I expect to be around to see it." This was what President Barack Obama promised a crowd at the Kennedy Space Center on April 15, 2010 as the U.S. congress approved the bill to accomplish this. Two different places, circumstances and directions were discussed. yet the idea of settling other planets has been in the imagination of man since flight became possible.

The obvious obstacles of distance and living conditions are the primary factors as even a radio signal between Mars and the Earth takes over 45 minutes to transmit. Also, the atmospheric pressure

Sky watch for the next

See six planets and the moon before 6 a.m. For all you early risers looking at the moon before sunrise May 23, there will be Neptune, Uranus, Jupiter, Venus, Mars and Mercury coming up before the sun is fully up by 6 a.m., so have a good telescope to catch this Victoria Day marathon.

Impress mom on her day May 8 at the 5 a.m. sunrise as Venus is with Mercury, Mars, Jupiter, Uranus, Jupiter, Neptune and Pluto in the southeast horizon. A rare treat!

M35 (Open Cluster) sets with the moon on May 6. If you're trying to find M35, focus on the moon after dinner on May 6 as it'll follow it on top as it sets in the northwest-west at about midnight.

The Delta Aquarids Meteor Shower, which is caused by comet 1P Halley, runs April 19 to May 28. It usually produces about 20 meteors per hour and peaks May 5-7 from 3:30 a.m. to 5 a.m.
