Comet ISON and meteor showers light up November sky

If you've already started your Christmas shopping, the heavens will light up the evening sky between store visits.

November usually features two meteor showers within the span of a week around the middle of the month. However, Comet ISON, dubbed the comet of the century, will make its debut later this month.

The Leonids meteor shower, which peaks on the night of Saturday, Nov. 16 until dawn Nov. 17, has produced some of the greatest meteor storms in history. However, the full moon will dramatically reduce the visible fireballs.

The Southern Taurids peaks overnight Monday, Nov. 11-12 and will be offset until the moon sets just after 1 a.m. to view the seven meteors per hour predicted.

Lastly, you can start to look for Comet ISON after about mid-November, close to the setting sun for about a month. If it gets as bright as predicted, you'll not only be able to see it with the naked eye, but it's also possible even in daylight!

Sky watch for the next month

The Leoniod Meteor Shower peaks on Saturday, Nov. 16 after night fall until dawn. Look towards the constellation of Leo. It should produce meteors at the rate of 10-15 per hour.
