Sky watch for the next month:

- 1 Jupiter Brightest- on Wednesday, May 09th after dusk look SE for the evening as the king planet is in opposition until dawn.
- Venus next to Crescent Moon- on Thursday, May 17thafter dusk look West as these 2 set around 23:00 in the NW.
- 3 Quarter Moon near Beehive cluster- On Monday, May 21st, you can check these out with your Victoria Day fireworks from sunset in the SWW.
- 4 Eta Aquarids Meteor Shower- caused by comet 1P Halley shoots 15-20 meteors per hour after Saturday evening May 05th and before dawn on Monday the 07th. The Waning Gibbous Moon will be out and blind much of it the Constellation Aquarius (SEE).
